EDUCATION

Orang Asli communities often experience limited access to quality education. Remote locations, lack of infrastructure, and cultural differences contribute to this challenge.

Children may have to travel long distances to reach schools, and inadequate facilities may hinder their learning experience.

LAND RIGHTS

as their traditional lands are frequently encroached upon for development projects, logging, or agriculture. The absence of legal recognition and protection for their ancestral lands makes it challenging for them to maintain their traditional lifestyles and threatens their cultural identity.





WATER SUPPLY

Orang Asli communities often face difficulties in accessing clean and safe water. Remote locations and inadequate infrastructure contribute to this problem. Contaminated water sources can lead to health issues, emphasizing the need for improved water supply systems and sanitation facilities in these areas.



Housing conditions in Orang Asli villages are often substandard, with inadequate infrastructure and limited access to basic amenities. Many live in traditional homes that may not provide sufficient protection against the elements. Efforts to improve housing conditions should consider the cultural preferences of the Orang Asli while ensuring the provision of safe and comfortable living environments
